CRITICISM OF SHOWS, AND OF AUDIENCES.

There have appeared recently a number of communications in which readers contribute their views on the character of acts and pictures shown in Auburn. In one of these communications published today, notably that signed L. C. E. there may be found what we believe to be the best contribution of any to the subject.

That writer says that if there are acts to which persons take offense it is chiefly because the theatergoers do not applaud or encourage the acts that are worthwhile and deserving of our support,

He finds fault with Auburn audiences and any reasonable person who has attended local performances and noted the attitude of most persons in the house as they ignored the really fine points of a play or the genuinely meritorious vaudeville acts, will bear out this critic.

There are some theatergoers who almost defy an entertainer to make them laugh or applaud a clean act. And the same class of patrons clap ostentatiously whenever anything risque is attempted.

The criticism is not directed to one particular playhouse, it applies to all. And L. C. E. declares that the manager who tries to make his playhouse clean and attractive for all is not only "knocked" when something offensive slips by but is even penalized by the icy character of the audiences which find fault with and never encourage the clean bills either by applause or abundant patronage.

To our knowledge Manager John J. Breslin of the Jefferson has closely watched his bills and attempts to provide a weekly program that will please, entertain and be helpful to all who attend the performances, but at times something will creep in that particular patrons do not like and that Mr. Breslin himself is unable for the moment to prevent. It is hardly fair to indulge in a sweeping and harmful condemnation without taking up the question with the management itself.

We believe that really constructive results will follow if the theatergoers follow out the suggestion of L. C. E. and be generous with their applause and commendation for good acts and reserve their chill for the acts that are open to criticism. Lije."-Kansas City Star.
